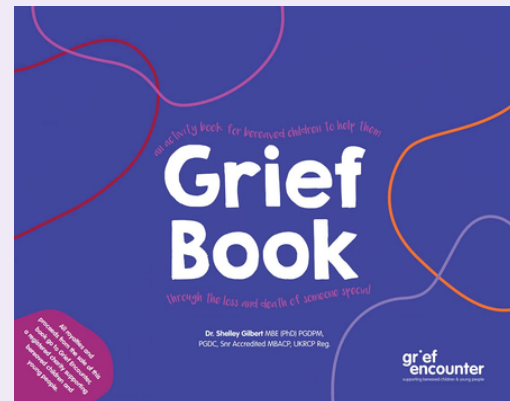

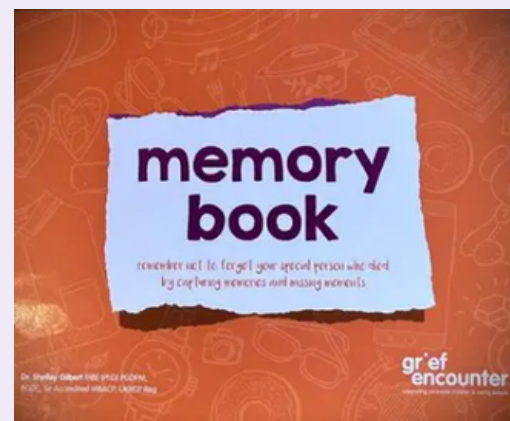
Interactive book helping children record past, present and future memories.

Outstanding cartoon story that explains (sudden) death in words that very young children can understand.

Oliver Jeffers (2010)

With beautiful illustrations, Jeffers presents us with a moving story of how a little girl's life is changed by the death of someone special, what happens and how we can make some sense of a loss.

Michael Rosen (2004)

Brilliant and poetic book, talking simply about the sad feelings following death, informed by his own experience of the loss of his son. Genius.

About Hedgehog

Dani Seatter (2025)

Beautifully written, this book captures the grieving process. The focus is on the searching, pining and missing your loved one, using animal illustrations. An invaluable book for bereaved children.

Medium Ones (Ages 7-11)

Two Weeks with the Queen

Morris Gleitzman (1989)

Fictional story about losing a brother. One of the best books ever.

Millions

Frank Cottrell Boyce (2004)

Moving, funny, brilliantly clever book about what two boys got up to after their Mum's death. Now, a major film.

The Star Outside my Window

Onjali Q. Rauf (2019)

Incredible story of meaning making after the death of her mother and loss of her home and friends whilst escaping from an abusive father. Highly recommended.

Milo and the Restart Button

Alan Silberg (2011)

The author writes from his own experience about 13 year old Milo and the premature death of his Mum. One of the best.

Harry Potter (series)

J.K. Rowling (1997)

The stories of Harry Potter experiencing the traumatic death of his parents needs no introduction, except to the importance of using the exceptional insights and themes of death when interacting with bereaved kids. Sheer genius.

A Series of Unfortunate Events

Lemony Snicket (1999)

Lemony experiences parental death very young; the whole series is influenced by these critical losses.

The Coat I Wear

Mel Maxwell (2014)

Outstanding book based on the loss of the author's sister using metaphor of a coat for grief. Everyone should have this book.

Spotlight Books

Older Children & Teens (Ages 11+)

Monster Calls

Patrick Ness (2012)

Incredible book and major film written by Patrick Ness, based on an idea by the late Siobhan Dowd. 13yr old Connor devastated and isolated finds no-one wants to talk openly about his mother dying, until the monster appears in his life and he is able to find the courage, encourage the adults to face the truth and say goodbye to his mother. Unmissable.

The Dead Fathers Club

Matthew Haig (2018)

A recent find, which fills the gap for teen story about experiencing the death of a Dad. As with all Matt Haig's writing -truly exceptional.

The Shock of the Fall

Nathan Filer (2013)

An account of mental health and also an insightful book on the death of a Mum and the subsequent grief over time.

The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse & Always Remember

Charlie Macksey (2019 & 2025)

The sharing of life lessons in this book is a great example of how young people battling with existential issues, following their tragic losses, can find meaning in life.

Oscar and the Lady in Pink

Eric-Emmanuel Schmitt (2008)

Brilliant book about a teen and the last days of his life.

The Lost Boy's Appreciation Society

Alan Gibbons (2004)

Quality writing which addresses difficult issues with care and understanding.

Grief Is The Thing With Feathers

Max Porter (2015)

Through the narrative of Dad and two brothers and Crow, the story of Mum's sudden death and how they create their new family of three is masterfully and intelligently told. Max's Dad died when he was 6, which allows the book its deep insights into the complex and paradoxical world of grief.

Anne Booth & David Litchfield (2022)

How a little boy lives with sadness; profoundly moving and full of depth.

When Dinosaurs Die: A Guide to understanding death

Laurie and Marc Brown (1998)

Cartoon style using dinosaurs to explain death. Delightful.

Up In Heaven

Emma Chichester Clark (2004)

Comforting way of talking about where people go when they die. A favourite.

The Hare-Shaped Hole

Doherty & Doherty (2022)

Addresses the loss of a friend through animals. A colourful and moving story that deals with rediscovering happiness.

Rabbityness

Jo Empson (2012)

Addresses loss through a rabbit. A colourful and moving story for that deals with the idea of loss and rediscovering happiness. Highly recommended.

The Lonely Tree

Nicholas Halliday (2005)

Beautifully written and illustrated. Uses the death of a tree to show how death is an inevitable part of ageing and life continues after the sadness of bereavement.

Why do things die?

Suzie Harrison (2020)

A lift the flap book to help talk about what happens when someone dies.

When Someone Dies (Questions and Feelings About)

Dawn Hewitt (2017)

Delightful and informative book to read to children about grief.

What Does Dead Mean?

Caroline Jay & Jenni Thomas (2012)

Beautifully illustrated book that gently guides children through the 'big' questions they often ask about death and dying.

Lost for Words e-book

Jackson & Ben Brookes-Dutton (2019)

Most of us find ourselves lost for words when someone dies: this is a collection of personal insights and advice for bereaved children by bereaved children.

The Invisible String

Patrice Karst (2018)

A best-selling picture book about the unbreakable connections between loved ones. Another list topper.

Saying Goodbye to Hare

Carol Lee (2012)

An uplifting story full of honesty and warmth. Sensitively written to give a positive, thoughtful message and explores feelings and questions children have after the death of a friend. (Includes guidance notes for adults supporting the child).

The Thing at 52

Ross Montgomery (2023)

Beautifully written using a metaphor of "The Thing" to illustrate finding and losing an imaginary friend.

Books for Little Ones (Ages 2-7)

General

The Copper Tree

Hilary Robinson (2012)

This beautifully written and illustrated book aims to help young children come to terms with the death of somebody close. It lets children know it's okay not to be okay and also offers a message of hope that things will get easier.

The Day the Sea Went Out & Never Came Back

Margot Sutherland (2003)

Delightful, classy books; whole series recommended.

The Memory Tree

Britta Teckentrup (2013)

A lovely story with animals, focusing on memory making after the death of Fox.

Death: I Miss You (A First Look At)

Pat Thomas (2009)

Clear and well-illustrated explanation of death.

The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark

Jill Tomlinson (1973)

A heart-warming classic containing an imaginative story about overcoming fears. Filled with gentle humour and comfort.

Badger's Parting Gift

Susan Varley (1984)

Mentioned as a introduction to death, but not so popular with bereaved kids.

The Velveteen Rabbit

Margery Williams (1922)

A timeless classic story about identity, love and loss. The rabbit reminds us that true value comes from love.

Dads

My Daddy is my Superhero

Michaelagh Broadbent. (2018)

Shares the message that positive memories remain even after death.

Mums

Missing Mummy

Rebecca Cobb. (2011)

Beautifully illustrated and poignant book about a child with her dad after Mum dies.

A Tiny Step Forward

Charlotte Khagan & Jill Starishevsky (2020)

Delightful cartoon style story/poem told by a little boy whose Mum has died,. It highlights grief's complex issues and paradoxes such as the tensions of being happy yet sad. Highly recommended.

Mum's Jumper

Jade Perkin (2019)

Empathic book about a Mum's death.

Only One of Me

Wells & Robinson (2018)

Poignant books written for children by a dying Mum as her legacy. Wonderful.

Someone Came Before You

Pat Schwiebert (2007)

A companion title to 'We Were Gonna Have a Baby but We Had an Angel Instead'.

Books for Medium Ones (Ages 7-11)

General

Laura's Star

Klaus Baumgart (2000)

Lovely to encourage imagination, fantastic illustrations. This book is a lovely way to share discussions whilst teaching about the struggle of letting go.

Belonging

Jeannie Baker (2008)

Illustrates the passage of time by a child looking through her window, seeing herself grow through the years. Fantastic.

Bear Shaped

Dawn Coulter-Cruttenden (2020)

An exceptionally written, deeply insightful and beautifully illustrated story of a child's reflects and highlight the child's deep sadness, darkness and isolation caused by the loss.

Choose Love

Nicola Davies and Petr Horacek (2022)

An exceptional book created by children's author which use real-life experiences poems and art about child refugees from Syria. Useful to inspire creative ideas.

How are you Peeling?

Freymaann & Elffers (2019)

Fun way to understand complex feelings, including those associated with loss, from the NY Times illustrator of the year.

How Do You See It?

Vera Galindo (2020)

Great kids book about an artist's way of seeing the world which could be used creatively to "talk" (paint/colour!) about death and dying.

Here and There

Kim Gregory (2020)

Great cartoon style book which poignantly demonstrates about being faraway, apart, better together and alone.

General

I See I See

Robert Henderson (2020)

Great book with an artistic way of allowing us permission to see the world differently which could be used creatively to "talk" (paint/colour!) about death and dying.

A Terrible Thing Happened.

Margaret Holmes and Cary Pillo (2000)

Great cartoon style book which explains the shock and aftermath when a tragedy occurs for children.

The Tiger Who Came to Tea

Judith Kerr (1970)

A children's book with hidden deeper messages about living with abject terror and survival from 2nd World War survivor, the late Judith Kerr. Simply genius.

The Huge Bag of Worries

Virginia Ironside (1996)

Helps a child address their worries in a delightful way.

The Rock From The Sky

Jon Klassen (2021)

Hard to describe but unmissable book about a "spot".

Guess How Much I Love You

Sam McBratney (2014)

Modern classic which helps to say how much you love someone.

Winnie-The Pooh series

A. A. Milne (1926)

The Dragonfly Story

Kelly Owen (2018)

A beautifully created story explains death and the concept of heaven to children in simple terms using an adaptation of the popular fable of how brown bugs transform into beautiful dragonflies.

The See Saw

Tom Percival (2019)

Range of books. Wonderfully telling of losing a teddy.

Love

Matt De La Pena & Loren Long (2018)

Wonderfully book about LOVE which could be read to a child not only to value the love lost but also the love in our lives that is all around.

The Boy who Built a Wall Around Himself

Ali Redford (2016)

One of the best books ever about how a child can use help to break through the barriers they've built up following adverse childhood experiences.

The Dot and Ish

Peter Reynolds (2005)

Ever a favourite to encourage a child to share through art. Joining the dots is a great way to make sense of a child's story of loss. Using 'ish' to find a middle balance is a great concept.

What on Earth do you do when someone dies?

Trevor Romain (1999)

Brilliant small cartoon book addressing some of the questions children have after a death. Comforting and compassionate.

Where The Wild Things Are

Maurice Sendak (2000)

Genius writer; this is a story of a little boy's escape into fantasy to manage the bad thoughts in his head. Directly related to the experience of trauma and loss.

The Giving Tree

Shel Silverstein (2010)

Classic tale of giving and the pain of loss from having loved something.

Stone Soup

Jess Stockham (2006)

Wonderfully re-telling of an old tale about coming together as a community.

Wherever You Are My Love Will Find You

Nancy Tillman (2010)

New York Times bestseller; wonderful for a parent or grandparent to leave a legacy.

Are You Sad Little Bear? and Can't You Sleep Little Bear?

Martin Waddell (2020)

Ever wonderful, needing no introduction will help young children in times of bereavement, loss or change, gently exploring the reasons for saying goodbye and giving reassurance that goodbye doesn't mean the end of things.

Knuffle Bunny

Mo Williams (2004)

Story of a lost boo-boo bunny. This one is found, but such a stunning book that could address the what ifs.

In My Heart: A Book of Feelings

Jo Witek (2014)

Literally explains what an emotion feels like physically in your heart adding new vocabulary. Another exceptional book.

Charlotte's Web

E B White (1963)

"Even in the face of death, life continues and ultimate goodness wins out." Novel with happy moments of friendship, whilst also communicating sad lessons about sacrifice, growing up and the idea of death as a necessary, normal part of life.

Charles Elton (2009)

Unusual book telling Luke's story following his dad's death. Worth a read.

Crossing the Line

Tia Fisher (2023)

Award winning story about what could happen after Erik's Dad dies. Highlights how vulnerable bereaved kids can be.

The Land of Never-endings

Kate Saunders (2018)

A rip-roaring adventure that gives an honest portrayal of grief.

Mums

Forever

Beatrice Alemagna (2020)

Amazing book with the message that a Mother's love lasts forever.

Love, Lucie

Marita Conlon McKenna (2012)

A book for 9-11 year olds loss of a mother.

Moon Pie

Simon Mason (2015)

Terrific story about children coping after their mother's death and their Dad turning to alcohol for support.

Mimi

John Newman (2010)

The ripple effects of a mum's death told in a fictional way. Excellent and poignant read.

Mum & Dad

James and the Giant Peach

Roald Dahl (1967)

James faces the world following the death of his parents.

The Little Prince

Antoine De Saint-Exupery (1971)

Classic tale, with themes of death, loss and meaning of life ready to be explored through the story.

The Chronicles of Narnia (and film)

C S Lewis (1939)

Exploring themes of endings, death and meaning of life in these stories can help children. It is well informed, as Lewis himself experienced the early death of his mother.

Bridge to Terabithia (and film)

K Patterson (1977)

Wonderful true to life story.

His Dark Materials (A trilogy)

Phillip Pullman (1995)

Legendary stories of Lyra and her demons, laced with the themes of loss and death. Unmissable.

Natasha Farrart (2015)

A tender, poignant, funny and heart-warming book about losing a sibling.

The Thing with Finn

Tom Kelly (2007)

Poignant fictional story about a boy losing his twin brother and finding his way through grief. A must.

Wenny has Wings

Janet Lee Carey (2005)

Beautiful novel about Will's near death experience, his sister Winny who did die and survivor guilt.. Highly recommended.

Charlie and Me

Mark Lowery (2018)

Story of a brother dying and of Martin's very special way of letting go yet keeping Charlie in his mind, in his way in his time. A special, very well written book.

The Truth About Martians

Melissa Savage (2020)

Mylo is desperate to be as brave as his older brother, who died a year ago. It includes science fiction and aliens.

Charming book about the loss of a friend.

Marion Deuchars (2018)

Sadness at the sudden absence of a friend addressed by acclaimed author.

A more adult version of the Deep Blue Yonder, with 14 year old Susie telling her story after her death. A major film.

Judy Blume (2011)

Moving story following her father's death by murder. The book ends optimistically.

The Blackwater Lightship

Colm Toibin (1999)

An insightful story about the deep and long term impact of a father's death on a family. Short listed for Booker Prize.

Kevin Brooks (2014)

Brilliant fictional account of life following the death of a mother and falling in love. Deeply insightful.

Solace of the Road

Siobhan Dowd (2010)

A poignant fictional story of a young girl left bereft and in care. Excellently written by author who since died young.

My Sister Lives on the Mantelpiece

Annabel Pitcher (2013)

Moving, sad, yet uplifting story of the death of a twin sister and brother following a terrorist attack.

Long Way Down

Jason Reynolds (2018)

Revenge after the murder of a brother, written for teen boys who hate reading.

Unmissable and amazing book about the loss of his wife Des and bringing up his son Jackson as the unexpected and unwanted role as a widower. The book is based on Ben's fantastic life as a widower blog.

Jon Harvey (2023)

Inspiring writing following a sportsmans loss of his brother: the day it all changed.

Jeremy Howe (2011)

Autobiographical well-written story of wife/mum loss.

Paul Kalanithi (2008)

Astounding account written by a dying neuroscientist

Harold Kushner (1982)

Some find this a comforting book, with his wisdom following the death of his son.

I Had a Black Dog

Matthew Johnstone (2007)

Exceptional, illuminating and moving book about depression, which can be used to describe how grief feels. One of my absolute favourites.

Deeply moving, oft quoted, account of Narnia author's grief.

Sister

Rosamund Lipton (2010)

Fictional account of sibling death is insightful, accurate and well-written.

Life of Pi

Yan Martel (2002) (also film)

Martel's writing offer us deep insights into what it is like to experience the death of your parents and sibling, left living with the fear of death as your constant companion. How caught in exhausting opposites, you find happiness where you can. Exceptional novel, that stays with you long after the final page.
